I read a fascinating article about a study done on pets that lead to better children's health. The article started out saying that Fido the dog and Ginger the cat need not worry about being replaced by a new baby. In fact they could help parents raise healthier children. A new study finds that children who lived with dogs or cats during the first year of life got sick less frequently than kids from a pet-free zone. The study, published in Journal Pediatrics provides fresh evidence for the counterintuitive notion that an overly clean environment might not be ideal for babies. Sharing a home with a pet might be an early form of cross-training for the body's defense systems.

Lap Dogs to Lab Dogs

In a recent article in Harrisburg's Patriot-News (April 22 – Elizabeth Gibson), attention was drawn to the practice of taking stray animals and selling them to laboratories for medical research. In some cases it was found that many of the animals had been stolen and sold to the labs. "Some are strays. Some are unwanted. The dogs are rounded up by 'suppliers' and sold to kennels, which sell them for big money to labs for scientific studies. The Feds have infiltrated these operations around the nation. Now they are raising questions about a midstate kennel. Hundreds of dogs are rounded up across the country, federal authorities say. Trucks bring them, in the middle of the night, to a rural kennel well off a narrow lane. Each animal brings \$50 to \$75. Dogs wait in a barn deep into a farm. Yelps and howls can't be heard from the nearest main road. Only a few neighbors know about the animal dealing operation."

Buddy was surrendered and the young age of 7 and I was his new foster home. He was a well mannered, had a exuberant zest for life with a big heart and seemed to smile as he sashay his happy trot over to greet you. He was a gentle giant and a bit oafish....I knew I had my hands full but the joy he brought to me at our initial meeting was over whelming. As he jumped into the back seat of my car and we were driving home, some how I knew he jumped into my heart and he wasn't ever leaving my home. Buddy had a way about him that touched everyone he encountered and you couldn't help yourself but love him. Buddy and I would have many talks throughout the day and I would periodically leave my computer for a 15 minute snuggle with him on the floor followed by gentle kisses we exchanged. He was my confidant and best friend and in turn he reciprocated his love, faithfulness and devotion like no other. He was a true mascot of rescue when a foster came to stay with us. Buddy made sure they learned the "lay of the land" but yet made them feel safe during their challenging time and stay in our home. Although very stoic, I noticed in March a few symptoms Buddy was having that led me to believe he could be worst than he was letting on. I took him to the vet when Payton had his annual exam April 4th at which time the vet found a very large mass on his spline. The sonogram found a second mass, but no other forms of cancer. I decided to perform the surgery only to learn he had microscopic cancer which was aggressively growing and he would not have more than 4-6 weeks. I was provided the option of euthanize or to continue with the surgery. I opted with the surgery. Buddy was so special, I felt it was my turn to repay him for all the joy he brought to me and give him a chance to revisit all the loves of his life one more time. Over the last remaining weeks we went to the creek in the back yard for a swim, to the farm numerous times to visit his equine family and friends, back to Mrs. Teri for a bath and grooming and personally visited every family member and neighborhood boy and girl (and their parents) that became his extended family over the years.

Week six after the surgery, he began to decline quickly in health. I tried everything I could possible do to help but by Thursday am, he was bleeding out internally and very uncomfortable....breathing took all of his energy. I can't recall a time feeling more desperate and helpless, but I knew it was his time and scheduled the vet to come to my home that evening to stop his suffering. May 17th was the longest day of my life. After he gave me 3 gentle golden kisses and a long "I Love You" look with his big brown eyes, Buddy was laid to rest in my lap at the base of the backyard waterfall where he loved to sit on one of the ledges & drink after our evening walks. Buddy gave me a piece of his heart years ago and took a piece of mine this day. Sometimes we forget how fragile life is. We forget that life is painfully limited. It seems so unfair that those limits so soon end the time we have with those we love. Yes...life is fragile, but how precious the time....how beautiful the memories. I will always love you Buddy! May you rest in peace....XOXO Mommy
