We also want to thank Maggie Salyers for agreeing to continue being our event coordinator!

GoldHeart is desperately in need of financial support, anything you could contribute would be greatly appreciated by our furry friends. Expenses last year exceeded income in excess of \$4,000.00. So far in the past three months, we have had to move funds from our money market account in order to continue to meet our expenses. In addition, many of our incoming dogs have required additional expenses, such as boarding, and more medical expenses than usual. As a result, our income has been outspent 3 to 1 (meaning for every dollar coming into the rescue, three are being spent). This places our ability to continue to achieve our mission in serious jeopardy.

Under the direction of Trish Thomas, we have developed several new fundraising efforts, they include the Bull Roast on August 25, 2008, several raffles, lottery, microchipping events just to name a few. In conjunction, our new Merchandise Coordinator, Bob Karifin has found several new items for our tables at the numerous events GoldHeart will be attending this year. Bob has worked closely with the board & Jen Brechin, our web designer, to reduce our expenses relating to merchandise & increase our revenue. By instituting the GoldHeart "Online Shopping Mall" shopping site, all of the websites featured on this page allows us to expand our offerings of merchandise to our Golden Family, while a portion of the proceeds come directly to the rescue without requiring us to commit to quantities & tying up funds for inventory that is badly needed in other areas. We are also expanding our grant application requests, and hope to see results from that soon, however we cannot depend on these grants being approved!

Overall, I am confident in Gold-Heart's ability to continue its mission, through our membership, our fundraising efforts, and our love of our furry golden friends.

I want to thank all the members of the board for all of their hard work and dedication over the past three months, without them & all they do, we would not be where we are today. And would like to challenge all of our membership to participate.

What Makes a Dog Territorial?

What could make a dog become unsociable with other dogs? Sarge is wonderful with people, but does not like other dogs in "his" territory. In the short time Sarge has been in the HOPE program, he has made great strides in re-learning how to interact with his canine friends. Sarge was not always like this. What could have caused him to become this way? Dogs left chained outside often develop these territorial issues. Other dogs, or even people, can torment the dog & he cannot do anything about it. When a dog like Sarge reacts to other dogs coming into his perceived space, it is purely out of fear. Dogs are social creatures. They do not like being separated from the "pack", or family. Isolation will do psychological damage to a pack animal like a dog. This is why anyone who adopts from GoldHeart must have their new Golden living inside of the home with the family, and not left tied up outside. Some states are now even passing anti-chaining laws.

- Treats for Your Goldens Picnic: There are several healthy treats you can give to your Golden. They can
  help him grow healthy and strong. Special treats made with great ingredients and lots of love will find a
  special place in your Golden's heart and tummy. The Joint Treats include Glucosamine, Creatine & MSM

Her wagging tail and bright smile said it all. "Welcome" to thousands of visitors at Mark Downs Office Furniture in Cockeysville, MD. Over her 12 years at Mark Downs she had become somewhat of a "celebrity" in Cockeysville where people would drop by the store just to visit with Maggie.

Maggie, a chestnut brown Golden Retriever knew her job very well. Monday to Friday she greeted hundreds of small business owners and corporate executives. On Saturday she played with children and even babies of small business owners who brought their offspring on a business errand to buy a desk or chair.

There were times when customers found their children asleep resting on top of the big dog's belly. Older children got a different type of greeting as they ran together weaving in and out of the furniture in the showroom.

One of her favorite visitors was the mailman; each day he brought her a treat. "If she wasn't waiting at the front door they would call her over the public address system and she would run to greet the mailman." said Steve Rosen, President of Mark Downs.

Most dogs never get a life so good, rescued at the age of two by Steve Rosen, Maggie suffered no serious illness during her lifetime.

The family and friends suggest a donation in her memory to the GoldHeart Golden Retriever Rescue Organization.

The family wishes to express their deepest thanks to Dr. Brooks and the entire staff at the Hunt Valley Animal Hospital.

She worked 5 and sometimes 6 days a week until her last few days. It's rare for large dogs - she was healthy to the ripe old age of 14+ (100 in people years).

Mark Downs employees on their own quietly went to the vet to visit and say their farewells. Maggie was the official "customer greeter" for the past 5 years. She promoted herself to the position the day after Dusty died. On that day she took her "post" at the front door.

Over the years Maggie "taught" hundreds of children that big dogs can be friendly and gentle. She has helped people get over their fear of dogs. One man who never left his house for any other reason, came to the store on a regular basis, just to visit with

We will all miss her. There are so many customers that will ask for her she's made hundreds, thousands of friends over the 12 years that she "worked" at Mark Downs.

# K.I.S.S. 🥔

The *KISS principle* (for "Keep It Simple, Stupid") states that simplicity should be a key goal and unnecessary complexity avoided. Common variations of the acronym include: "Keep It Sweet & Simple", "Keep It Short & Simple" and "Keep It Simple, Silly". The idea is that complexity should be avoided—simplicity is a goal in itself. An approach that seems "too easy to be true" is in fact the best way. Surprisingly, the very obvious approach is often the best.

GoldHeart has grown to over 200 members with an active group of 12 to 15 core volunteers who perform the bulk of the rescue efforts. Please consider doing at least one thing, every year, on behalf of GoldHeart. Take the K.I.S.S. approach to volunteering for GoldHeart! Feel free to Keep It Sweet & Simple.

How did you first learn about GoldHeart Golden Retriever Rescue? Perhaps it was at a "Meet Our Dogs Day", Pet Expo, newspaper article, or word of mouth. A GH member volunteering a few hours of their day gave you the opportunity to adopt your Golden. Is this something you could do? What about college applications or resume building activities? Volunteer work is a highly regarded endeavor.

Each of us has different knowledge, skills and abilities. Significant accomplishments can be achieved when differing talents work together. The "Golden HeartBeats" newsletter is an example of K.I.S.S. As different members volunteer to put it together, they are going to use a layout design that is easiest for them. Are you or a member of your family a budding artist or writer? Submit a cartoon or article for this newsletter. There is certain thrill in saying that you have been published!

A gentleman attending a recent "Meet Our Dogs Day" stated that he heard about GoldHeart via a donation jar at a local restaurant. Attached to the jar was a flyer advertising the event. The simple act of a GH member asking the owner of the restaurant she frequents if she could place the items at that location brought another prospective member to GoldHeart.

#### History

GoldHeart was started in 1999 by a small, dedicated group of volunteers with an undying love for Golden Retrievers. The initial group of volunteers were members of the Golden Retriever Rescue Education, and Trainings (GRREAT), complementing GRREAT's efforts by concentrating GoldHeart's mission in the northern Maryland, south-central Pennsylvania and Delaware areas.

During the first five years of its existence, GoldHeart volunteers successfully placed nearly 300 Golden Retrievers in "forever homes," with this year promising to be our busiest year yet.

GoldHeart has grown to have over 200 members with an active group of 12 to 15 core volunteers who perform the bulk of the rescue efforts.

#### Mission

GoldHeart, Golden Retriever Rescue and its network of volunteers are dedicated to the rescue of unwanted, abused, neglected and displaced Golden Retrievers. We provide Goldens in need with a temporary safe haven in our foster homes where they receive love, food, grooming, medical treatment, and some training. During this time their temperament is evaluated to determine the best home for their personalities, and ultimately they are relocated to loving adoptive "forever" homes.

GoldHeart volunteers work to foster a public sentiment of humanity and gentleness toward Golden Retrievers and all other animals. They encourage and promote responsible pet ownership, do all within their power to reduce the pet overpopulation and will work to encourage humane treatment and care of animals through education and spay/neuter advocacy.

When our second Golden Retriever crossed the Rainbow Bridge, we realized we were hooked on the breed, and wanted to get another Golden from either the local pound or Golden Retriever rescue (GRR). We ended up applying to two local rescues, and Goldheart (GH) responded quickly (the other rescue never did), and within a few weeks we were set up for a home visit & approved to adopt. All interactions with the GH organization were timely, professional, and the dedication to promote & encourage responsible pet ownership was clearly evident.

That was back in 2004 when we adopted Dillon (now Buck), GH #202. Buck was an unwanted one year old who had pretty much been left outside in the yard alone. He had been brought back at least once to GH due to behavioral problems before we took on the challenge. With the support & guidance of the GH community, & lots of work, he is now a pretty great dog (he still has his moments, but we wouldn't trade him for

#### anything).

The network of volunteers at GH are nothing short of phenomenal & because of them about two years ago we became more involved with the rescue, and in addition to being available to perform home visits & intake, we have fostered three dogs for GH. Our first foster was an ex-police dog, Rusty, GH #367, who sadly ended up being diagnosed with inoperable cancer shortly after entering GH. GH provided full support to us & covered all medications and bills as we helped Rusty transition over the Rainbow Bridge.

Our next Foster, Paige, GH #399, was just 3 years old, had already had multiple litters, and when brought to GH from a high kill shelter was Heartworm Stage 3 and Lyme positive. We initially fostered her during her Heartworm treatments, but after that we knew this little girl had found her forever home with us and Buck. Throughout Paige's recovery, GH staff was again there to offer assistance & support. Without GH intervention, Paige surely would not be here today.

We have met all the current officers and many of the members, and I would be challenged to find another volunteer organization that has such a phenomenal and dedicated group of people. The GH team truly lives their mission every day and it is clearly evident through their good works. They make a difference in the lives of so many animals, the families that adopt, and always focus on responsible pet care and ownership including mandatory spay/ neutering of all animals brought into the rescue. No question, GH changes lives (two and four legged alike), and excels at fostering positive public sentiment towards the humane treatment of Golden Retrievers and all other animals.

#### **Poisonous Plants**

Springtime holidays are often associated with bulb plants and ingestion of the bulbs causes the most severe illness. Summer holidays are associated with plants. Here are some of the more common spring and summer holiday plants and information on their toxicity.

- Tulip (Tulip spp)- Ingestion can result in intense vomiting, depression, diarrhea, hypersalivation, drooling and lack of appetite.
- Hyacinth (Hyacinthus oreintalis)- Ingestion can result in intense vomiting, diarrhea, depression and tremors.
- Daffodil (Narcissus spp)- Ingestion can result in severe gastrointestinal illness, convulsions, seizures, low blood pressure and tremors.
- Peace lily (Spathiphyllum spp)- Ingestion can result in ulcers in the mouth, vomiting and diarrhea.
- Easter cactus (Schlumbergera bridgesi)- Ingestion can result in vomiting, diarrhea and depression. Cats can also develop staggering.
- Easter daisy (Townsendia sericea)- This plant is considered non toxic.
- Easter orchid (Cattleya mossiae)- This plant is considered non toxic.
- Easter lily cactus (Echinopsis multiplex)- This plant is considered non toxic.
- Resurrection lily (Kaempferia pulchra)- This plant is considered non toxic.
- Crown of Thorns (Euphorbia splendens prostrata)- Ingestion results in vomiting and diarrhea.

#### Plants that are considered very toxic and can result in severe illness or even death include:

- Azalea (Rhododendron spp)- Ivomiting, diarrhea, hypersalivation, weakness, coma, hypotension, CNS depression, cardiovascular collapse and death.
- Crocus (Colchicum autumnale)- Excessive salivation, abdominal pain, diarrhea, vomiting, gastro-intestinal disorders, lack of appetite, tremors, convulsions, seizures
- *Rhododendron (Rhododendron spp)* Vomiting, diarrhea, hypersalivation, weakness, coma, hypotension, CNS depression, cardiovascular collapse and death.
- Tiger Lily (Lilium tigrinum)- Vomiting, inappetence, lethargy, kidney failure. Cats are only species known to be affected.
- Easter Lily (Lilium longiflorum)- Vomiting, inappetence, lethargy, and kidney failure. Cats are only species known to be affected.
- American Bittersweet (Celastrus scandens)- Weakness, convulsions, gastroenteritis (vomiting, diarrhea.)
- *Clematis (Clematis sp.)-* Vomiting, diarrhea, oral ulcers, ataxia irritant or vesicant action.
- Daffodil (Narcissus spp)- Severe gastrointestinal disorders, convulsions, shivering, hypotension, dermatitis, muscular tremors, and cardiac arrhythmias.
- Day lily (Hemorocallis dumortirei)- Vomiting, inappetence, lethargy, kidney failure. Cats are only species known to be affected.
- Foxglove (Digitalis purpurea)- Cardiac arrhythmias, vomiting, diarrhea, weakness, cardiac failure, death.
- Lily of the Valley (Convalaria majalis)- Ataxia, vomiting, cardiac arrhythmias, death.
- *Narcissus* (Narcissus spp) Severe gastrointestinal disorders, convulsions, shivering, hypotension, dermatitis, muscular tremors, and cardiac arrhythmias.
- *Morning Glory (Ipomoea spp)-* Seeds may cause hallucination, may cause diarrhea.
