HOW DO YOU DO THIS ALL THE TIME?

It was quite a busy winter for the GoldHeart intake team. We took in 9 dogs in Nov. 2 in Dec. None in Jan. but took in 12 in Feb. and 7 in March. Right now there are 5 in the wings waiting to come in and no one has stepped up. As usual we never have enough foster homes to go around. Vacation season is right around the corner and for some reason folks find it easier to just give up their pets rather than pay to have someone watch them. We get those calls a lot. Top reasons we hear for give up are:

- 1. Moving, dog can't go
- 2. New baby
- 3. No time
- 4. We want to travel

I have had some people ask me "How do you do this all the time?" "How do people just give up their pets"? I tell them that the hardest part of rescue is to not judge that person who is having to give up their pets. You are not in their shoes. For some families it is the most devastating thing they have ever had to do. I feel those are the families that absolutely love their pet but know it is the right thing to do. That's when I put a new leash and collar on the dog and I walk away with their pet and try to hide my tears so as not to upset the family even more. Most times that is the family that stays in touch with GoldHeart for years hoping for a bit of news on the loved one they had to give up.

So now we are back to the shortage of foster homes. If you, as a member or any friends or family would like information on fostering one of these precious 4 legged friends in need of a soft place to land for a little while please let any of the GoldHeart board members know. We always welcome new foster families.

We also have a few events coming up over the year. If you can volunteer at any of these events please check the GoldHeart calendar and contact the person in charge of that event. One big event will be the Crab Feast on Aug. 1, 2015. Please contact Donna Blake the treasurer, if you can help with that event. It is an evening of good food and fun for all.

We have had a lot of GoldHeart family members lose their precious furry kids this year and our hearts go out to them. We have all been in their shoes at one time or another. It is always so hard to say good-bye. What a great thing to know they await us at the Rainbow Bridge.

Here is hoping that April showers bring those May flowers and not bring us a bunch of goldens in need of new homes. Our goal is to someday not need the rescue business at all. Wouldn't that be great, to never have another homeless animal in this world.

You can also commit to providing gift cards and/or gift certificates, plush animals, plants and wine/beer for the plant wheel.



Volunteer Foster List Update

Hi Everyone:

Yes, it's me, Barb Schaefer, the pesky president of GoldHeart. It has been brought to my attention that even though we have quite a few people on our foster home list, that the same people keep offering to foster.

As you know, we never have enough foster homes. We have been lucky enough to not have turned any dogs away because some of our foster homes are willing to take on more than one foster at a time. This has been a blessing. Some foster homes get tied up with one foster who needs a lot of medical care and therefore are not able to take on another foster.

I am asking everyone and anyone who is already on our foster home list to let the intake coordinator Carol Ruell know that you want to remain on the foster home list or to please remove you from the list. Even if you could only do an emergency foster for a day or so, this helps us avoid putting that incoming dog in a kennel situation which costs the rescue money. Some families that are on the list never respond and that's okay. We just don't want to bother you with the emails.

I am asking the members at this point to specify what they would be interested in doing, fostering, emergency foster (1 or 2 days), volunteering for events, transports, home visits, dog sitting for a foster home who is going away.

The Mayor of Dogtown – Mac (GH255) 1998-2015

When I first met Mac, he was in a tiny studio apartment in a not-so-nice area of Baltimore. He was 6 years old. He was excited to meet me and my other golden Indie, but settled down for a few short minutes to plonk his butt on my feet and gaze lovingly into my eyes and BAM! I fell in love. Mac continued to love us for the next 10 years and 3 months.

He was a dog with a huge personality and I say if a dog ever had ADD then Mac was it. Always sniffing, always doing, always running, always saying hello, which is how Mac came to get the name "The Mayor of Dogtown". He wanted to "talk" and "shake hands" with everyone and anyone he met. Our friends loved him, our family loved him, the neighbors

(and their kids) loved him.

Mac adored his "big sister" Indie. From the moment he set eyes on her he would follow her around, pester her by grabbing on to her tail and pulling so she would play, and laying down next to her to sleep. They had been together for 3 years when Indie was diagnosed with cancer. During one particularly uncomfortable night for all of us, he lay down next to her, put his paw on hers and leant against her. I swear I saw him whispering in her ear — "I'll be OK. You can go if you want to".

Mac was obsessed with tennis balls; and I mean Obsessed! Especially the bright yellow new ones. We had a big bag that we would keep on the book shelf in the kitchen. He would bark at them until we gave him one. Eventually I hid them behind the books, so he couldn't see them. About 3 years later, he was in the kitchen one day barking at the bookshelf. He continued to do this for about 2 or 3 months – I thought it was mice, but whenever I checked it out there was nothing there. Finally, I stuck my hand in behind the books where he was looking and there – yes you guessed it – I pulled out a half full bag of tennis balls, and he went nuts!

One morning, when Mac was around 12, he couldn't stand up. We rushed him to the vet and then to an oncologist, an orthopedist and a neurologist... in that order. After a thorough exam, x-rays, a sonogram, an MRI and spinal tap, he was diagnosed with Rocky Mountain Spotted fever. An aggressive course of antibiotics knocked it out of him, but he remained with the long-lasting effects that made his hind quarters weak. He did fine for a while but old age caught up with him and along with his arthritis, he began to slow down. He still did the sniffing, the doing, the running, the saying hello, just a tad more slowly.

As the years went on he was still full of joy and love, still playing with his brother. We took him to rehab on a regular basis, getting laser therapy, massage and underwater treadmill to keep him strong and mobile, but he was getting older. Our vet asked us if we were going for the "oldest living golden retriever" record and at 16 years old he was getting there (that honor apparently goes to Max, a golden living in British Columbia who lived to 19 ½ years old). Even at 16 he insisted on going for his daily walk, even though it was only 20 minutes and needed a harness to help him walk.

As with all things, when the time came Mac did it with enthusiasm. He stopped eating one day, and didn't want to go for a walk. The next day we took him to the vet; he walked into the room, just lay down as if to say "let's do this".

He was always so full of enthusiasm, loved to walk, and play. He would talk to anyone who wanted to and many who didn't. Our Mac, Macaroni, The Macster, Old Man, Maccie Boy. He was the light of our lives and the joy of our heart. Good night sweet prince.
