A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Welcome Spring! This Newsletter is going to be geared towards a plea for foster homes, volunteers to do home visits, volunteering at events, transports and welcoming any new ideas for fundraisers. We are in dire need of new foster homes. If you know anyone who you think would make a great foster family, please pass this on and maybe it will inspire you to learn about fostering.

FOSTERING: We are always looking to add to our "foster family list". These families provide a soft place for an owner surrendered golden, stray or abandoned to land for several weeks and sometimes longer depending on what he/she needs coming into rescue. Yes, it is a big commitment. If you or anyone you know would be interested in fostering, please check out our Fostering section and complete an application at our website.

Here are some fostering FAQ's:

What is fostering? - Fostering is the most important aspect of rescue. Agreeing to foster a golden on its way to rescue, you agree to take care of the dog as if it were your own. Providing love and attention, adequate exercise, food, water and shelter. The duration of foster care varies, it can be from 5 days to a few months or on some occasions, we bring in one that is special needs and requires a permanent foster. (GoldHeart provides the medical care for these goldens who most often are at the end of their lives. You provide that love and comfort until they cross over the Rainbow Bridge. To take on a special needs or a sick foster is the biggest commitment of all.)

What are the requirements to foster? - GoldHeart requires our foster homes to complete an application (we use the same application for foster, adopt and foster-to-adopt, so just check the foster box). If you have pets of your own they must be spayed/neutered, up to date on all vaccines and on heartworm year round (unless there is a medical reason). We will then check your vet references and a volunteer will do a home visit. Once you are approved to foster, your name will go on the foster home list. When a plea goes out for a foster home for a golden coming in, we try to be very thorough about sending along what we know about the dog and if you think he/she is a good fit for you and your family. Then, you email the intake coordinator. Once you have your foster dog, a foster packet will be sent to you. Each golden gets a new leash and collar, some toys, a GoldHeart ID tag and a volunteer will contact you about coming to micro-chip your foster if he/she has not already been chipped. Your foster packet will also include an adoption contract and a lot of information. If you do not have a fenced in yard, you are required to keep your foster dog on a leash. They may not run loose while in foster care unless it is in a secured area. Pets must be kept indoors while you are away or at work.

Will I have to pay for veterinary expenses? – As a volunteer, you will not be expected to pay for veterinary charges associated with your foster. A foster family is required to use one of our GoldHeart approved vets. If that particular vet will not bill GoldHeart directly, you can have that vet call the president or the treasurer and the bill will be paid right away. If you do pay the vet bill, in your foster packet you will find an expense report or you have access to an expense report online. Fill it out and send it along with your receipts to treasurer@goldheart.org for reimbursement.

Does a foster get paid? – No. Fostering is strictly voluntary. But, if you're an animal lover, the reward you feel from fostering and assisting in the placement of your foster dog into his/her forever home, is a great joy. You, as the foster family, get to choose where your foster dog goes.

What happens if I fall in love and want to adopt my foster dog? – We find that some rescues discourage foster families from adopting their fosters. Within the GoldHeart family, we have many foster homes that are also affectionately known as "FAILED FOSTERS." Naturally, as your foster Golden's first new family, you have the opportunity to adopt him/her. GoldHeart hopes and prays that you will continue to foster other dogs too!

If you are interested in welcoming a dog into your home as a foster family, please submit an application online today. HOME VISIT VOLUNTEERS: We are always in need of folks to do a home visit especially in the Maryland area. This requires your time and your dog. I usually allow about an hour to do a home visit. Do you remember when you were waiting for that volunteer to call about your home visit? You waited and waited and sometimes waited a little more.

What is involved you ask: Once the basic foot work is done by the application coordinator a request is put out to the Home visit Coordinator and she finds the closet volunteer and asks will they do this home visit. There is a basic questionnaire to fill out which gives you an idea of what to look for in the home. A volunteer takes their own personal dog along on a home visit. We look at the condition of the interior and exterior of the home. Anything that causes concern of the dog being harmed. At GoldHeart we do not require a fenced in yard but if the family has a physical fence it must be in good repair. You look at any current pets in the home. Do they appear well taken care of? How does the family interact with your dog and how does their dog interact with you dog. Once you have completed the home visit you fill out the home visit form with your findings, you call the applicants personal references and ask a few questions about that applicant and send everything to the application coordinator who will approve or disapprove that applicant. Remember, we want our goldens to go to the best forever home so if you have any concerns about their safety in that home make sure you let the application coordinator know about them.

VOLUNTEERING AT EVENTS: All the events that GoldHeart is going to do are listed on the website. Dates, time and location. Even if it is a small event it's always great to have a few volunteers to handle things. Most of the events are all pet friendly so if you have a well behaved dog we encourage you to bring them. At GoldHeart we do not do on the spot adoptions so we don't usually have foster dogs there but it is nice to have previously adopted dogs so that people can see the quality of dogs that come into the rescue. We have donation vets that the dogs walk around with so they can collect money for GoldHeart. Sometimes the booth gets very busy and folks are asking questions about fostering, adopting and volunteering. We need help with these folks and also extra volunteers so that the other volunteers that are there can go eat and go shopping for their pets. You may have already told us about areas you are available to volunteer (part of membership/volunteer application available on line under Volunteering), and if you can't remember if you did, just send our coordinator an email at volunteer@goldheart.org.

TRANSPORTS: Sometimes we get a call about a dog that is too far for one volunteer to reach so we put out a plea for several folks to help get the dog to the family that is going to foster. Maybe the family surrendering the dog doesn't have transportation or they feel more comfortable meeting you and have you meet the dog in it's own home. Since we sometimes bring dogs in from the south and from Egypt, we need someone who can pick up the dogs from the transporter coming from the south or go to JFK or another airport to pick up this precious cargo.

FUNDRAISING IDEAS: Your ideas for fundraising are always welcome. We are always looking for ways to raise funds for the medical care for the goldens coming into the rescue and making sure they get the best care that we can give them. We also buy a lot of supplies that are needed for these pups. We supply each foster with a new leash, collar and ID tag. Flea/tick meds, heartworm meds. Each dog that comes in is micro chipped and GoldHeart pays for the registration of that micro-chip. Each foster family gets a foster packet for their pup, so if we have toys or bones donated to us we put some in the packets. Remember, some of these precious pups come with nothing,, they don't know what it is like to run around with a ball or chew on a bone or lay on a nice soft bed.

Again please address any board member with your ideas for fundraisers. One fundraiser that we have going right now is the Spring Grilling Bundle. Look for details in the newsletter or go online to the website <u>www.goldheart.org</u> and get all the details. This was a great fundraiser last year and hopefully it will be as successful this year.

I sure hope this letter inspires some of you or your friends to volunteer to foster a golden in need. Thank you everyone for all you do and for always being there for GoldHeart and these precious pups. Just to say thank you sometimes never seems enough.


















GoldHeart Easter Pet Photos Fundraiser


We will miss him always, and Rocky, you will live on forever in our hearts. Until we meet again,


