A LETTER FROM THE PRESIDENT

Hello GoldHeart family. Sorry this Spring Newsletter is so late, and is now reaching you as we are ready for Summer. There are 24 good reasons for that. For those of you who don't know, in late January (during the Pet Expo) we were contacted by a cat rescue in North Carolina about a hoarding situation, 49 goldens, poodles and doodles were seized by the SPCA, rescuing from a situation where the pups were living in the woods in filthy kennels.

GoldHeart agreed without hesitation to take eight of those dogs. A transport was quickly put together by the girls in North Carolina to get these dogs to Virginia and our VP, Sabrena Garrison, and another GoldHeart family member, Ann Kunkel, got a transport together and an emergency plea went out for foster homes. Foster homes stepped up not knowing what they were getting into. We had no idea the condition these pups were in, we just knew we needed to get them into GoldHeart and give them a chance at a better life. We were told to expect any female to be pregnant and that six were heartworm positive. For short, we call the group the NC8.

Some of the dogs were very shy, never been on a leash, had no idea how to play with a toy. Such a sad situation. The foster homes have done an outstanding job. It has been a long haul with both Lyme and heartworm treatment for most. We are just now getting close to the end of the heartworm treatment for six, and hope in the coming weeks they will be able to resume normal activity and get spayed/neutered, and those that are not failed fosters, will soon be ready to look for forever homes. This has been many months of care and major expenses for the rescue.

On February 6, Mallory, one of the NC8, GH-1229, gave birth to eight of the cutest doodles. Unfortunately, Baby Bea, GH-1235, did not have the strength to go on. After three trips to the ER at about six days old, the decision was made to let her go. It was a hard day for the foster family and GoldHeart. Many people were praying she would make it, and we thank everyone. The rest of the litter did fine and continued to grow and get stronger. All seven have been adopted out to wonderful GoldHeart approved homes.

We thought we were lucky to only have one pregnant female from the NC8, until one morning at 3:30 am, I received a phone call from Harper's, GH-1224, foster mom telling me that a puppy had been born. What a shock, no one knew this girl was pregnant, not even the vet. She came into the rescue very underweight and malnourished. By 8 am we had a litter of 9 baby doodles. All the puppies and the mom did not do well and ended up at the hospital for weeks. With the help of the vet and the vet techs everyone survived. Momma Harper has completed her heartworm treatment and is doing well in her FTA home. At this point, all but one puppy has been adopted.

So you see, we had 8 adult doodles and 16 puppies that have required our full attention, so those are the 24 reasons why this newsletter is late. Hope you'll forgive us, but we've been just a little busy. This adventure has cost GoldHeart more than \$15,000. If you would like to donate to help us offset these medical bills you can do so by going to the website https://goldheart.org/about-goldheart/make-a-donation/. Any donation, any amount, is always appreciated.

Starting on June 2nd we started a fundraiser. THE GRILLING RAFFLE. This package is from Warrington Farms in Dillsburg Pa. I would like to thank everyone for always being there for GoldHeart and helping us to be able to continue our mission of saving these beautiful dogs.

CROSSING OVER THE RAINBOW BRIDGE

It is with a heart that is broken in a million pieces that I tell you of Flo's passing. She was a wonderful dog that was unfazed by anything. She came to me directly on November 15, 2017, from JFK Airport after her flight from Egypt. Barb Schaefer brought her to me that very day. I chose her because her tail was blurry in the photo from Egypt. I knew she was wagging it.

She had been spayed but she had mammary masses that needed to be removed. We needed to take x-rays. It was then that we found out she had been shot at some point in her life because the bullet was by her chest. Then she began to bleed as though she was in heat. We did an exploratory surgery looking for part of an ovary that may have been left...nothing. Then with further palpation, we found a vaginal tumor. It was a venereal tumor. Somewhat rare in the USA. The treatment was chemotherapy. Thank you to Goldheart for making her treatment possible. She had 6 rounds of chemo and never missed a beat.

The oncologist told me she did great and she was one of their favorite patients! She came to me blind in 1 eye but that didn't stop her. She saw me through some terrible times of my life. She was a calming force to my trials. A true blessing. And then...she broke a couple toes and was in a splint up to her elbow for 4 weeks. Whenever she needed x-rays, we were able to take them without any type of sedation. She laid perfectly still. She was so special. Like no other dog I have ever had. She loved whoever she met and they loved her back. I was fortunate to be able to take her to work with me at Shiloh Vet Hospital. All my coworkers insisted I bring her if they hadn't seen her in awhile. And then...her blind eye developed severe glaucoma and it had to be removed. She was such a trooper.



She was sweet, brave, and I can say, perfect. She developed a rapidly growing tumor around her neck that caused her pain that I knew was severe. After all she had been through and being as stoic as she was, for her to not want to lift her head or wag her tail, I knew she was in tremendous pain. The decision was heartbreaking but I owed her the comfort that she gave me. We have a gazebo at the office. It was a beautiful sunny day. She had Hershey kisses and sugar cookies and candy. Her favorite was Smarties. She passed surrounded by the people most important to her.

Dearest Flo, you were a gift from Heaven. You will always be in my heart

The foster home pulled Baby Bea from the mom and started to bottle feed and she was starting to thrive. She had to be taken to the ER one night where she was diagnosed with Bronchial inflammation. With meds and regular bottle feedings she seemed to be doing ok. A few days later she started to spiral downward and after another trip to the ER she was diagnosed with an enlarged heart that was also malformed, fluid around the heart and

lungs. At this particular time the Vets and the foster home consulted with GoldHeart and the foster home decided it was time to let her go. On 2/12/23 Baby Bea crossed over the Rainbow Bridge.

We want to thank her foster family for doing everything they could for this precious little soul. I know your hearts were broken when you make that decision but you knew what was best for her.
